

PQG member Metha S. opened by introducing the visiting manager of Meissner Sewing and Vacuum Center, T.J., who as a PQG Affiliate had generously contributed to the Tri-Guild Luncheon.

Metha has a long, strong history with making Hawaiian quilts. As a young wind surfer in Hawaii, she took Hawaiian quilt making



courses and made her first quilt in 1968. She has now been making them for twenty years, and has taught others how to for the past fifteen. Hawaiian quilts were originally so personal, they were often buried with their owner. Tradition included a hole designed in each quilt to release its owner's spirit. Sharing was limited to family only, if anyone. It wasn't until a resurgence of international interest in quilts that Hawaiians decided to share theirs with the greater world, expand fabric choices and accept machine sewn methods. Metha showed her quilt collection and demonstrated how the simple designs are made and applied. Mahalo, Metha. Thank you!

Presidents' Letter

Lemonade out of lemons...

The inspiration for this letter comes from my recent trip. My husband and I rode to Arizona to visit various locations and points of interest. Along the way we had challenges and

rewards and all in all had a wonderful time. Our final day was as it turns out one of our biggest challenges. We spent our last night in Bishop, California on the East side of the state along Hwy. 395. We checked out of our hotel room and gassed up the motorcycle and were headed north by 9:25 AM. I had checked the weather before we departed and rain was expected in Bishop about 11:00 AM. As we headed north we were on a steady elevation climb and the temperatures were going down and raindrops were landing on our face shields. We decided to pull off and put our rain suits on. As per a lucky chance a CHP stopped to see if we needed assistance and we explained we were just getting



ready for the weather. The CHP had heard of snow further north so she got on her radio and checked the conditions for us. The report was the roads were open with no restrictions, but the snow was sticking and she did not advise motorcycles to drive through those conditions as they would only get worse. With snow beginning to fall on us at this location the decision was made to turn around and avoid the mountains. So when we started out in the morning our mileage home was 350 miles at about 6 1/2 hours. At this point we had gone 40 miles and our new route would be a total of 610 miles going all the way to Bakersfield and then turn north again. We did make it home about 11:15 PM, almost 14



hours later with a few hot chocolate stops along the way. My husband turned out to have the fever I had had a few days earlier. It was a comfort to be in my own bed that night. So the moral of the story is that when things look so out of reach if you persevere goals can be completed. Another note, when I was just beginning to sew I had made myself some article of clothing and it didn't turn out the way I had envisioned and my mom in her wisdom said "just chalk it up to experience".

So instead of sour lemons it was turned into lemonade. If you have some UFO's maybe they can be redesigned and find a new purpose. Enjoy some lemonade.
