Greetings,

As we wrap up our annual membership renewal, I thought it might be helpful to ponder what being a guild "member" entails.

As defined in our bylaws, the Purpose of the Guild is to:

- Preserve the heritage of quilt making.
- To further educate the membership and community in the art of quilt making.
- To contribute to the welfare of the residents of the Petaluma area by providing quilts to people in need.

We fulfill our purpose in many ways including: taking our Opportunity Quilt out into the community, making Military and COTS quilts to warm and comfort, and sponsoring educational and inspiring programs for our members. All of this is possible because of you, our members.

Members are part of a collective entity where individuals join for a common purpose or shared interest. Membership comes with certain rights, privileges, responsibilities, and obligations within that group.

The specific responsibilities of membership in a quilting guild can vary from one guild to another, but there are some common expectations and responsibilities that members are typically asked to fulfill.

- Payment of Dues: Dues help contribute to the costs of running the guild.
 Currently dues provide approximately 25% of guild expenses.
- 2. Regular Attendance: Consistent attendance helps build a sense of community and camaraderie within the guild.
- 3. Participation: Active participation is encouraged. This involves actively engaging in discussions and activities during meetings, volunteering for guild committees or events, or contributing to community service projects.
- 4. Contribution to Show-and-Tell:

 Members are encouraged to participate by showcasing their work, discussing their techniques, and providing inspiration to others.
- 5. Contribution to Guild Projects: Members are asked to contribute their time, skills, or materials to these endeavors. This could involve making quilts for charity, making small craft items, promoting the opportunity quilt or participating in a group quilt challenge.
- 6. Promotion of the Guild: Members are expected to help promote the guild and its activities, whether through word-of-mouth, social media, or other means.
- 7. Financial Responsibility: Members are responsible for fundraising or other financial obligations to support guild activities.
- 8. Contribution to Leadership: Members are encouraged to consider taking on leadership roles and responsibilities. It takes a large and diverse team to prevent burn-out and stagnation.

A vibrant sustainable guild requires we all participate in one way or another to support our purpose and each other. Everyone has unique skills, talents, passions that can benefit our guild. Please don't be afraid to share yours!

Perplexed about how to complete your quilt top? Need inspiration for a fabulous finish? Look no further! Join us for a **Dynamic Borders workshop on Saturday, March 4, 2024**. Linda Wagner will spark your imagination and inspire your creative spirit with her fun and fast techniques.

"Borders can just be there or they can be what defines your quilt and gives it real visual impact. Do not settle for the quick and dirty. A little extra piecing can create tremendous attention-getting results," she says.

The class focuses on a simple block, with six variations, and methods to fit them to any size quilt. Start with the samples from class, then move on to your own quilt top.

A class fee of \$40 includes a set of black and white strips you will need, which you will add to the fabrics you bring. Workshop will be held from 9:30-4:00 pm in Rohnert Park.


